2023 Large Item Collection

ZORRA TOWNSHIP APRIL 24

REQUIREMENTS

- Set out by 7 a.m. the Monday of your collection week. Late set outs will not be collected.
- Max weight for any item is 45 kg or 100 lbs.
- Bag tags are not required for large items.
- Place items no more than one metre from the curb.
- Items must be on your property, not across roads/ ditches, and easily visible (clear of tall grass).
- Do not place small items on top of larger items. Inaccessible material will be left behind.

DOES YOUR ITEM QUALIFY?

- ☐ Does it weigh more than 45 kg (100 lbs)?
- ☐ Can it be broken down into a garbage bag?
- ☐ Is it eligible for a recycling program? See below.
- ☐ Is your item small but you have a large quantity?

If you answered "yes" to any question, your item **does NOT** meet the requirements.

THIS PROGRAM IS FOR LARGE ITEMS

It's NOT a spring clean-up Non-program material will be left behind, and the homeowner will be responsible for removing it. Note: automotive parts, glass, mirrors and items piled on trailers/wagons or loose in boxes will not be collected.



Reduced Load Season

A reminder to all drivers of heavy trucks and equipment that the reduced load season takes effect from **February 15 to April 30** inclusive each year. In accordance with By-law 21-03, signs will be posted on applicable Township roadways.

Half Load Season Rationale

- Minimize long term damage to infrastructure
- Problems caused when roads are soft and often require major repairs
- Prevent additional damage to culverts and bridges
- Heavy loads do damage to road sub-base that is difficult to detect
- Changes in the size of agricultural equipment i.e. large liquid manure trailers
- Multiple aggregate producers in Township
- Infrastructure repair costs borne directly or indirectly by residents
- All of the above lead to safety issues during Half Load Season.

BATTERY RECYCLING




The Township of Zorra has a free program for the recycling of household batteries through Raw Materials Company Inc. (RMC). The program is being offered at four locations throughout the Township:

Applying for a Building Permit

To complete a building permit application, please register an account at www.cloudpermit.com. You will complete the application online and be required to upload a site plan, drawings, and designer information to the application. For more information on how to submit an application or if you are unsure if your project requires a building permit, please visit the Building Department webpage or contact us at ext. 7231.

Failure to obtain a Building Permit may result in a penalty of double the permit fee, as per the Township of Zorra's Building By-Law No. 18-19.

Drainage Department

Construction Drains

- Construction on drains are initiated by a petition that is filed by the landowner, county or even the Public Works Department of a municipality.
- Council will either accept or reject the petition.
- If Council accepts the petition, Council will then appoint an Engineer to carry out a study and report.
- Drainage meetings will be arranged and notifications will be mailed to the landowners within the watershed.
- It is very important that any notifications that a landowner receives from the Township be fully understood by the landowner.
- It is essential for all landowners to understand all the deadlines, appeal dates and the financial implications of the drainage work.

Emergency Preparedness Guide

Emergency preparedness is a shared responsibility. All Canadians are encouraged to be prepared to cope for at least the first 72 hours of an emergency, while emergency workers focus on those in urgent need.

Personal Support Network

In addition to this, consider creating a personal support network. A personal support network is a group of at least three people you know and trust and who would help you during an emergency.

How do you create a support network?

- Ask people you trust if they are willing to help you in case of an emergency. Identify contacts for important locations such as home, work or school. Neighbours are often the closest and most available contacts in an emergency.
- Tell these support people where your emergency kit is stored. Give one member a key to your home.
- Include a support network contact who is far enough away that they are unlikely to be affected by the same emergency.
- Work with your support network to develop a plan that meets your needs.
- Practice your emergency plan with your network. If applicable, show them how your special needs equipment works.

#DoingYourPart

Is there someone in the community that could use assistance in getting prepared for an emergency? Do they have special needs for their mobility, hearing or vision? Perhaps they have a non-visible exceptionality such as specific medications or a severe allergy. In event of an emergency - offer your support. Fire Permit Activation has Changed

Do you have a fire permit on a property in Zorra Township? The phone number to activate your permit has changed.

All burn permit activations must call the new Dispatch phone number 519-842-2481 as of March 1, 2023.

Does your permanent fire permit information require updating?

- Has the contact information changed?
- Do you have additional addresses to add to your file or properties to remove?
- Do you have questions about the conditions, or wish to review the parameters in which you can burn?

Consider checking in and verifying the information we have on file for your permit so when the time comes to activate your permit you can proceed without issue.

DPEN AIR Burning Permit required)

- Open Air Burning is not permitted in hamlets or built-up areas.
- Application forms are available at www.Zorra.ca
- Burn piles must not exceed 9 square meters and 2 meters in height unless otherwise approved by the Fire Chief
- · Burns shall be located at least 30 meters from any combustible structure
- Permitted ONLY during daylight hours and MUST be extinguished before dark
- · No burning of petroleum-based products
- · A responsible adult must be present at all times
- No burning is permitted during high-risk periods or poor air quality days.



By-Law Enforcement

Recreation Vehicle (RV) Parking:

Notice to all RV/boat owners. Our Zoning By-law allows front driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1 – October 31. After October 31, front driveway storage of these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. After October 31, the vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5 foot setback.

Rules about dogs:

The weather is now changing and dogs are outside for extended periods of time, please be aware of the Animal Control By-law 43-15. The By-law prohibits dogs from running at large. The result of which may be a fine of \$200.00 plus fees. Dogs require a leash at all times when walked. They shall not wander (Running at Large) on public or other private properties. In addition, all excrement shall be picked-up and properly discarded in a garbage bin as outlined in the By-law. Failure to do so could result in a fine of \$125.00.

Fireworks

Residents may set off consumer fireworks on their private property 2 days prior to and 2 days following Canada Day, Labour Day, Victoria Day and Diwali as long as they are set off before 11PM, by persons 18 years of age or older. Consumer fireworks are prohibited from being discharged inside of any building, structure, or vehicle. Written approval by the Chief Fire Official is required for discharging fireworks from municipal property including streets, lanes,

squares, parks, etc. Reminder for residents to let their neighbours know when they plan to set off fireworks.

Fireworks may be sold in the Township, 7 days prior to Canada Day, Labour Day, Victoria Day and Diwali, to persons 18 years of age or older, as long as the retailer receives an approved permit from the Township.

2023 Budget Facts



Council approved the 2023 Budget at the January 18th meeting and reports are available on our website for your information. We now wait for the County to finalize the tax ratios before we can finalize the Township's tax rates for 2023. Some key points include:

- Capital Budget will need \$3,005,180 collected from taxes to fund all projects scheduled for 2023
- The Operating Budget requires \$7,346,437 from taxes to fund the operation of the Township
- Total taxes for the year to be collected is \$10,351,167
- This is an 8.15% increase over 2022
- The Township saw 1.35% increase in growth
- If the tax ratios remain the same as 2022 (the tax policies that set the tax ratios are conducted at the upper tier level by Oxford County), an approximate increase of 6.72% for the tax rate, just under the 6.9% rate for cost of living at the time the 2023 Budget was produced.
- Including the 2023 tax rate increase, this is an average of 2.46% of the tax rate over the past 6 years for Zorra residents.

PRE-AUTHORIZED PAYMENT PLAN FOR YOUR TAXES

The Township of Zorra offers 10 or 12 month or by installment due date Pre-Authorized Payment Plans. If you are interested in enrolment, you can find the authorization form on our website at www.zorra.ca or you may call Lynda at 519-485-2490 ext. 7222.

A VOID cheque will also be required. You may enroll in any of our plans throughout the year provided that your account is in good standing. We require 30 days notice for any new enrollments or changes existing banking account information.

If you are currently enrolled in one of our pre-authorized payment plans, you DO NOT need to re-apply each year.

ON-LINE OR TELEPHONE BANKING

Online or telephone banking is available. All banks accept Zorra as a client and the account number required is your ROLL NUMBER from your tax bill, starting after 3227. For example, 012-010-13100-0000, you would enter this as 01201013100, if an error occurs, please add the extra four zeros at the end and try again.

2023 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Property Taxes for the 2023 taxation year will continue to be based on the January 1, 2016 valuation date. Property assessments will remain the same as they were for the 2022 tax year, unless there has been changes to your property.

SOFTWARE ENHANCEMENTS ARE COMING!

The Township of Zorra's Finance Department is working towards software enhancements that will improve efficiencies.

With these changes, it will be even more important that your online banking payee information is correct.

Please ensure that your account number listed for on-line banking is your roll number and that you have a separate payee set up for each property tax account (for each tax notice that you receive).

For example, if your roll number is 3227-012-010-02222-0000, for on-line banking purposes you would enter this number as 01201002222 (no dashes or spaces).

If an error occurs, try entering the four zeros at the end and this should resolve the issue.

You can check to make sure your account number is entered correctly in your on-line banking by going to your list of payees and selecting Zorra Township Taxes.

You should be able to edit the payee and this is where you can confirm that the roll number has been entered correctly.

ZORRA MULTI-USE COURTS COMMITTEE

The Zorra Multi-Use Courts Committee is working towards bringing multi-use courts to Thamesford! The courts will be used to play basketball, ball hockey, pickleball, and tennis, and will serve as a community hub for all Township of Zorra residents to enjoy.

Committee members Andrew Goodwin, Brenda Carnahan, Julie Riley, Libby Wilkinson, Kate Lockhart, Rebecca Ruddy, and Deputy Mayor Katie Grigg have been working hard to fundraise for the multi-use courts. The total cost of the project is approximately \$266,500.00 with the Township of Zorra Council committing nearly \$80,000.00 to the project (once the remaining funds have been raised). This means that the ZMCC and the community need to fundraise approximately \$186,000.00 for the courts!

To raise money for the multi-use courts, the committee has hosted pickleball tournaments, volleyball tournaments, Christmas craft markets, and sold Cinnabons - just to name a few of their past fundraisers! The Zorra community has also been *doing their part* to help fundraise for the multi-use courts. Sugar Bloom Floral in Embro donated \$100.00 from their Valentine's Day sales to the multi-use courts project this winter. In March, the Thamesford Lions Club donated \$50,000.00 to the multi-use courts project!! This generous donation brings the committee a big step closer in their fundraising goal and has brought the Lions Club to "partner" level donation status. SWIM FOR LIFE LEVELS:

PARENT & TOT

Structures in-water interaction between pare4nt and child, participants will experiences the importance of play while developing water-positive attitudes and skills. Classes will be made available based on age and child development. For Parents and Children up to 3 years of age.

PRESCHOOL, Levels 1 to 5

The basic aquatic progressions work to ensure swimmers become comfortable in the water and have fun acquiring and developing a foundation of water skills along with an appreciation and a healthy respect for the water. For Children 3 to 5 years of age.

SWIMMER, Levels 1 to 6

The Swimmer levels make sure children learn how to swim before getting in too deep. For swimmers as young as 5 years old, and accommodates all abilities from beginners to those continuing to develop their skills. For Swimmers 5 years of age and older.

Additional Residential Units in Zorra Township



The Township of Zorra is in the process of updating its Zoning By-law to allow for Additional Residential Units (ARUs) in settlements and on rural residential and agricultural lots, where appropriate. County Council approved Official Plan Amendment (OPA 285) on February 8, 2023 which directs Townships to identify zones where ARUs are to be permitted and establish standards and requirements for these units. Background information regarding OPA 285 is available on *Speak Up, Oxford!*

What are ARUs?

Additional Residential Units (ARUs) are separate, self-contained dwelling units (i.e., own kitchen, bathroom and sleeping areas) that are inside, attached to, or ancillary to (located on the same lot as) a single detached, semi-detached or street townhouse dwelling. ARUs can take many forms, such as basement apartments,

attached suites, tiny homes and coach houses, but they must be smaller than the principal dwelling or residence.



A wide-ranging list of artisans, festivals and events, businesses, non-profit organizations, heritage sites, and other cultural resources in Zorra Township is being compiled by a volunteer Cultural Mapping Task Force set up by Council.

The inventory was requested so an interactive map of Zorra's arts and culture sector could be developed by Township staff. In turn, this would help Council identify ways it might provide improved service to local artists and others involved in culture-related activities.

The online information also would be a ready reference for residents and visitors, enhancing the marketing and promotion of local art, events and the many other cultural opportunities in Zorra.




Book and memorial honour Thamesford legacy of W. Harvey Beaty

Over the past year, a memorial to W. Harvey Beaty has been taking shape in the Thamesford Lions River Park – a labour of love, of sorts, for Thamesford resident Doris Weir. But the time spent on the memorial, being constructed in partnership with the Township of Zorra, pales in comparison to the many months spent by Weir compiling a recently-published book of memoirs about the remarkable Thamesford-based businessman.

Weir worked more than 15 years at Cold Springs Farm, the company Beaty founded in 1949 – naming it after the springs that created a "village swimming hole" in the Thames River at the back of the 110-acre property that started it all – and oversaw until his death in 1994. She started there in 1987, so had seven years working in the office interacting almost daily with the boss before he passed away and Cold Springs Farm was split up and sold.

Maple Leaf Foods eventually took over the poultry processing facility on the original farm site that had grown over the decades into Zorra Township's largest employer. Maple Leaf closed the plant in 2018 and the property was sold the following year to the Township; it is currently being redeveloped for housing and municipal uses.



In April 2020, Weir approached the township about documenting the barns and processing plants before all the buildings were demolished, as a way of preserving a record of what had been essentially the lifeblood of Thamesford for decades. She was given access to the site, along with Beachville District Museum curator Stephanie Radu. Weir was able to take dozens of photos which are now available through a Flickr account. And Radu was able to acquire dozens of artifacts and documents.

About 45 of the artifacts – including boxes that employees picked up their Christmas turkeys in, work permits, cones for poultry deboning, promotional DVDs, turkey shackles, years of service plaques, key rings and trophies from the employee association's participation in hockey tournaments – are now in the possession of the Beachville District Museum.

Other documents secured by Radu at the time were passed on to the Oxford County Archives. Not long after, Weir was surprised to be contacted by former Cold Springs Farm Turkey Division Vice President George Leroux. Having learned of her effort to preserve the site's history, he informed her that he had in his possession other photos associated with the company.

"So he gave me a bunch of negatives," Weir explained in a recent interview. "But with the negatives came this memoirs book. I started looking through the book and immediately I thought, 'oh my God, people have to know about this."

On two different occasions in 2020-21, she was laid off from her job due to COVID-19. She decided to use this time to "digitize" the memoirs by scanning pdfs of the pages and converting them to text, then going through that text word-by-word to ensure the writing translated correctly from the written to computerized word.

Generally spending between 2-3 hours per day at it ("I can't sit at a computer all day"), it took her approximately six months. The memoirs included notes written by Harvey Beaty himself about his early life, pre-Cold Springs employment and business ventures, successes and setbacks as

the president of Cold Springs Farm, and other activities. They also included a "biography" of sorts written by Cold Springs Corporate Secretary Fred Wisdom under the title "Cold Springs Farm Limited: First 50 Years."

With all this information digitized, she now had to figure out how to make it available to the public. She decided on the https:/lulu.com self-publishing website. For editing assistance, she credits Cheri Handy as well as Linda Schwientek from JC Graphics, and her book is adorned by three paintings by Dorothy Adams – who was commissioned in the early 2000s to create murals chronicling the company's heritage.

"It was verbatim," she says of the information contained in her book – entitled simply "W.

Weir was working in the office at the time some of the events and business dealings took place but she admits she wasn't aware of many of these

upper-level dealings. "There were things in the book I knew nothing about," she said. "You didn't always realize it while you were working there but it was such an incredible company, so vertically integrated. I don't think you'll ever see another company like that again."

Even the descriptions in the memoirs about Harvey Beaty's partial paralysis were a surprise to her. The truth is that Beaty broke his spine in 1943 after falling from a ladder but "it was never talked about. I assumed he got polio... He called himself 'crippled' but it never affected the way he did business."

Harvey Beaty used a wheelchair or walked with the help of crutches for the rest of his life.

All the while, Weir had been thinking a memorial should be put up in honour of Beaty and his wife. She originally thought it should be put on the site of the original farmhouse attached to the original farm but the changes and development that subsequently took place in that vicinity made

her reconsider. Then she learned from a fellow member of the Thamesford Lions Club that Cold Springs Farm had also at one time owned – and subsequently donated for use as a park – the property now home to the Lions River Park. So her focus shifted there.

Weir decided to sell copies of the book to raise money for the memorial. The Lulu website offers a publish-on-demand model and, through that, she has so far sold approximately 400 books with approximately \$10 from each book going towards the memorial.

Already, a stone with an engraving and accompanying sign are in place at the park.

A garden has been created and Weir plans on adding to that garden when the weather allows. She also looks forward to the coming months when she hopes the Township of Zorra is able to expand the pathways in the park to include a path past the memorial.

"It's been fun. I feel like it's so important that I do this, because I don't want people to forget Mr. Beaty." He put a lot of money and in-kind donations into Thamesford, she stresses. In the winter, he would send someone over to clear the snow from the arena parking lot. Cold Springs employees watered flowers and cut grass on some municipal properties. "Because that's just what you did. Or at least that's what HE did."

Harvey Beaty has been honoured in various ways both while he was alive and since his passing. Perhaps most notably, he was inducted in 2018 into the Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame – with the first two paragraphs of his biography reading as follows: "William Beaty was the founder and chairman of Cold Springs Farm Ltd., an enterprise that he started in 1949 in Thamesford on 100 acres. By 1994, it had grown to include 60 farms and nearly 9,000 acres for producing hogs, turkeys, chickens, beef cattle and crops, along with a feed mill, grain elevators, processing plant, fertilizer plant and more."

"Harvey was renowned for his business acumen, his concern for the environment, his support for Supply Management and his generosity towards countless people and organizations, a generosity which continues today through the Erma and Harvey Beaty Endowment Fund."

But Weir believes many Thamesford residents aren't aware of his legacy.

Asked what she thinks set Harvey Beaty apart and set him on a path to creating this legacy, Weir believes work ethic played a part. She knew a one-time neighbour of Beaty who would see Harvey at his desk at 10:30 p.m. writing. Weir imagines

him thinking about what the next breakthrough was going to be, or which company or farm to purchase next.

In the book, he writes, "I get my enjoyment out of solving problems and putting things together and making them work. When an operation becomes routine, I want to leave it with someone who likes routine and I move on to something new."

Thinking of what Weir said and what she found in his memoirs, I imagine Beaty in the 1970s sitting at that desk long after sundown thinking it would be a good idea to buy the company's own heavy industrial equipment, concrete batching plant, and a fleet of ready-mix concrete trucks so they could continue with construction without delays. It was something that was unheard of at the time for a company whose predominant business was primary agricultural production, and probably will never happen again. But it worked at that time.

Notes under the heading "Construction" in the book outline Beaty's rationale for the 1978 decision. It has become apparent to him, after close to 20 years of construction and renovation projects on the Thamesford site as well as on purchased farms, that "the building program carries on forever, it seems, at an ever-increasing pace."

"The first Cold Springs project (was) the remodelling of the (former dairy) barn in Thamesford into a five-floor brooder barn" after the original Billy McKay farm was purchased in 1949, he recalled. "Next was the building of the #6 barn in 1950 to be followed by the #7 barn in 1954. (Then) came the new killing plant and, in the fall (of 1955), the #9 brooder building." Between 1957-59, three more brooder buildings – numbers 10 through 12, ranging in size from 24,000 to 32,000 square feet – were completed, as well as a turkey hatchery.

"1960 brought on the building of the West #1 brooder house of 28,000 square feet on the West Farm and the East #2 brooder house containing 75,000 square feet being built in 1961." And between 1972-78 "there were 14 concrete grain storage silos built, equipped and put into use as needed."

Make no mistake, Beaty made sure the company got full value out of the decision to diversify into concrete. "The feed mill was constructed in 1979 to completion in 1981... The sewage treatment plant was built in 1982. The Protein Recovery plant was built in 1980-81. Grain receiving and storage terminals were built in 1983 at both Harmony and Dresden. The fabrication plant and Farm Centre

warehouse were built in 1987, and the pork plant in 1988-89."

There was also the Putnam complex for Cold Springs Agri-Services in 1985-86, with additional offices and a truck service headquarters added a year later. "Over the years on the various farms, probably 100 sizeable brooder and finishing barns have been built (and) at least 30 hog farrowing and finishing barns have been constructed." In short, Beaty's assessment of the building program – that it "carries on forever" – was true.

Amazingly, this is far from the only section of the book that presents what, to the average person, would seem like a dizzying whirlwind of stress-inducing activity. Under sections entitled "Turkey Breeding," "Hatchery," "Processed Product Sales," "General Farming," "Farming in Michigan," "Hog and



Pork Production." "Joint Corporations," "List of Property Purchases," "The Florida Project" and numerous others, the progression of the Cold Springs Farm business all under Beaty's direction - must have left him with little or no time to sleep ... for four-and-a-half decades!

There must have been times when he worried about financial threats. In notes probably written around 1991, Beaty assesses the performance of the pork processing facility. "While the plant so far has been a loser, ways will be found to

keep it operating, for it is a good modern plant. Cold Springs is not alone in this profit pinch."

He also writes about a short-lived, early 1980s foray into dairy production. It was, as Fred Wisdom states in his "Cold Springs Farm Limited: First 50 Years" section of the book, "a sorry period in the group's history" during which the dairy division never turned a profit and was discontinued by 1990.

"Farm milk production is best in the hands of an owner producer who looks to the caretaking of the cows for his salary, perhaps with some of his family," Beaty offers in his memoirs. "It does not pay off," he concludes, under the Cold Springs Farm employee model.

Despite these setbacks, however, Beaty never shied away from risks. He built a company that, when it came time to sell it following his death in 1994, no one else could have taken over in its complete format. There were some huge corporate names interested in Cold Springs assets at the time but they only wanted portions of the company.

None of them had the ability to dream about the next acquisition, or the next diversification project, the way Beaty did in front of his Thamesford desk on those late evenings.

Weir laments that the notes and memoirs she digitized to compile her 400-page book cover the business part but not so much the personal part of Harvey Beaty's life. She seeks to rectify this, to a degree, in the "Acknowledgements" section, where she thanks her husband (also a former Cold Springs Farm employee) and kids "who listened to me enthusiastically talk about Harvey, his life and his humbleness while creating an empire." And speaking to me about her book and memorial projects, she added, "he was never high on himself. He was high about other people. He always said his employees were his best asset."

Reading through the pages carefully, however, reveals significant references to Beaty's personality and personal life.

He writes, in a section entitled "Private Life with Help from Others," about his marriage in 1955 to front office employee Erma McFadden, who had lost her husband – the father of her three children ("a ready-made family," Beaty said) – to cancer. Erma "accepted my proposal of marriage," he wrote. "I am grateful that she did for we have had many years of pleasant times together."

This statement is followed by a touching passage about her care for the physical challenges related to his paralysis.

And Wisdom's section includes "extracts from a speech made by W. Harvey Beaty to a group (unknown) in the middle 1970s, published here because he reveals his philosophy of life and gives the reader an insight into his character." In the speech, Beaty talks about his early life on a small mixed farm near Milton without electricity or running water, where "in the wintertime, the pot under the bed usually froze. But we were comfortable, we slept on feather ticks with down comforters. My mother raised geese and we used feathers and down."

It was an era of loose hay piled on wagons and stacked in the barn; of corn and spring grains cut and tied into sheaves then loaded by hand onto wagons and hauled by horses to the barn to be fed into threshing machines or cutting boxes "It was hard work but I enjoyed it," Beaty wrote. Perhaps not surprisingly given his mother's enterprising work with poultry, Harvey – the oldest of four – first entered business raising chickens and eggs during his final two years of high school to help pay for post-secondary education in Engineering at the University of Toronto.

Not wanting to enter the active overseas fighting of World War Two, Harvey instead sought employment in an agricultural sector supporting the troops. He landed in Seaforth, heading up a flax growing and processing company. Flax fibres, three times stronger than cotton, were used in the war effort for such things as parachute cords. It was in Seaforth that Beaty suffered his debilitating fall from the ladder while removing a tree limb in March 1943. He spent three months in Toronto General Hospital, another month in Seaforth "in bed at my close friend's home," and did bookkeeping for his friend's plumbing business "while continually trying to figure out what I could do with my future."

In September, after consultation with his family, Beaty's parents decided to give up farming and purchase a feed and seed store in London; at age 27, he rejoined his parents – both in home life and in business.

Almost immediately, Harvey's penchant for deal-making became evident. Within a year of taking over, the Beatys purchased a feed mill in Thorndale to streamline the supply of grains to the store. The next year, they rented a farm in Westminster Township to grow beans and corn. And in 1947 they were back in the poultry business, first selling baby chicks from a hatchery in Exeter and eventually establishing a first-of-its-kind "cut-up chicken" outlet to serve the city's home cooks. Aiming to streamline the supply of poultry, Harvey Beaty purchased the farm in Thamesford in 1949. And the rest, as they say, is history – a history meticulously detailed in Weir's digitized collection of memoirs and writings.

A second book is in the works. Weir learned that one former Cold Springs Farm staffer possesses every single edition of the employee association newsletter, which was published from 1984-94. She's going to compile excerpts from these into "Part 2" of the Cold Springs Farm story.




After Nearly 150 Years, Golspie Dairy Modernizes the Retail Market


