Share the Road

Farm operations are always extremely active in the fall with harvest season. Please pay special attention to the large equipment moving about on Zorra roads. Especially during this busy time of the year, we like everyone to share the road equally, be aware, and be courteous. We know farmers are extremely busy during harvest time and it is important to take that extra care regardless of which vehicle they are using.

Brush, Leaf and Yard Waste Depot

Zorra has a Depot for brush, leaf, and yard waste. Located across the road from the Kintore Public Works Shop at 783045 Road 78, just east of Highway 19.

- **Acceptable materials include:** fruits and vegetables, garden hedge and tree trimmings, grass, leaves, Halloween pumpkins, house and garden plants, brush (no longer than 6ft). and Christmas trees.
- **Unacceptable materials include:** garbage, old fencing, plastic bags, hazardous waste, top soil, rocks, and stumps.

This depot is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There is no charge for this service.

Construction Zone Sign Classification

In a Construction Zone, "Local Traffic Only" means you are accessing a property inside the section of road that is closed. It does NOT mean that you live in the area adjacent to the construction and the closed road is the shortest distance to your destination. It is a Highway Traffic Act Offence to misuse this privilege.

Building Department

Building Permit

A building permit is the written authorization which grants legal permission to begin demolition or construction of any structure, addition, or renovation. It is reviewed and issued when a complete application has been submitted and the plans comply with the Ontario Building Code, the Township of Zorra Zoning By-Law and other applicable laws and regulations.

Building Permit Applications

To apply for a building, demolition or septic permit, please visit the Building & Drainage section of the Township website for full details and instructions.

All permit applications must be submitted online through Cloudpermit. First-time users will need to create an account before starting an application. Step-by-step instructions on how to register and use Cloudpermit are also available on our website to guide you through the process.

Building Resources

Visit the Building Department webpage for helpful guides on decks, temporary tents, and additional residential units. These guides have been developed to help property owners understand applicable building requirements. While they are a useful resource, it is important to consult the Ontario Building Code to ensure your project complies with all applicable regulations and requirements.

Building Permits and Property Assessment

Improvements to your property may impact your property assessment. Changes such

as additions, renovations, or new construction can affect the assessment value of your property as determined by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC). Drainage

Legal Outlets

With the pressure of too much work and not enough time, there may be a temptation to take shortcuts. This is a reminder that the following are NOT legal outlets:

- **Roadside Ditches:** You can only use roadside ditches as an outlet if permission is granted by the road authority. If permission is granted, we recommend that you secure the permission in WRITING.
- **Private Ditches:** Private ditches are private infrastructure and unless permission is given, another property owner has no right to connect a newly installed tile drainage system to a private ditch that flows across a neighbouring property. Similar to using a roadside ditch as an outlet, if permission is given, make sure it is in WRITING. If work needs to be done on the neighbouring property, make sure all parties are clear on cost-sharing and also that all parties are clear on the extent of work and the potential disruption of land.
- **Municipal Drains:** Municipal drains have a defined watershed; the lands within that watershed have paid for the construction and management of that drain and only these lands have the right to connect to the municipal drain. If you are installing tile drainage on a property, it is possible that only a portion of that property has the legal right to connect into that drain. If you are not sure, check with the local drainage superintendent before undertaking the work. If there is a section of land that is outside the limits of the watershed, you must ask for permission to connect those lands to the drain.
- **Wetland or low area:** Sometimes it's tempting to outlet a tile drainage system into a wetland area, particularly if the wetland is located on your client's property. However, before doing so, you should examine the area to determine if the outletting of the tile drainage system could be any impact on other property owners. If there could be, don't do it without first acquiring permission.

If a property owner is unable to secure an outlet, that owner has the right to petition their municipality under the Drainage Act for an outlet. Although it takes longer to get the outlet using the Drainage Act, when it is done, you can have confidence that the tile drainage work you perform will not result in legal action. If you still decide to take shortcuts on legal outlets, remember that the courts consider the tile drainage contractor to be an expert. You may want to check out the liability risk of you and your business.

Drainage: Frequently Asked Questions

Why am I being charged under the Drainage Act?

In rural Ontario, drainage systems—such as municipal drains, ditches, tiles, and culverts—are essential infrastructure. They help remove excess water from farmland, roads, and properties to prevent flooding, protect buildings, and keep land usable.

The Ontario Drainage Act is provincial legislation that allows municipalities to:

- Construct and maintain these drainage systems, and
- Recover the cost from the properties that benefit from them.



How are the costs determined?

When a municipal drain is created or improved, an engineer prepares a report that:

- Identifies all properties that benefit from the drain
- Assigns a share of the cost to each property based on benefit, outlet use, and responsibility

This process ensures that:

- Properties that benefit more from the drain pay a larger share
- Costs are distributed fairly, rather than paid by all taxpayers equally

Why am I paying if the Drain is not on my property?

You may still benefit from the drainage system even if its not located directly on your land.

For example:

- Your property may drain into the system (called an "outlet")
- The drain may reduce flooding risks in your area
- Municipal roads you use are protected by the drainage system

Because of these indirect benefits, the Act allows costs to be shared among all affected properties.

What are the charges for?

Charges under the Drainage Act typically cover:

- Regular maintenance (cleaning, repairs, vegetation removal)
- Major repairs or improvements to aging systems
- New drainage works (if applicable)

Maintenance costs are usually smaller and occur periodically, while construction or major upgrades may result in one-time or financed charges.

****Many of the reports used for drain maintenance are over 50 years old****

How are maintenance costs charged?

Municipal drains require ongoing maintenance to continue functioning properly.

This includes:

- Cleaning out sediment and debris
- Removing vegetation and blockages
- Repairing erosion or damaged sections Under the Drainage Act
- Maintenance is arranged by the municipality when needed
- The cost of this work is charged out to the properties listed in the original engineer's report
- Each property pays its assigned percentage (assessment) of the total cost

Unlike new construction projects, maintenance does not require a new engineer's report each time. Instead, costs are distributed using the existing schedule of assessment already in place for that drain.

This means:

- Charges may appear periodically, depending on when maintenance is required
- Smaller maintenance activities will still be billed proportionally
- The municipality is responsible for coordinating the work, but not for absorbing the cost

Why can't the Municipality pay for it?

Drainage systems are different from general municipal services. Under the Drainage Act:

- Costs must be assigned to benefiting landowners
- Municipal taxpayers at large are not responsible for privately benefiting drainage works

This ensures fairness—those who receive the benefit contribute to the cost.

****The Municipality pays for the drains that run within municipal-owned property (roads, parks, etc.)****

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY AND PLANNING FOR EMERGENCIES

REVIEW YOUR PLAN AND CHECK YOUR SUPPLIES

Sit down as a family to talk about different kinds of emergencies and review your family emergency plan. Does everyone know what to do and where you will meet if you are not together when an emergency takes place? Work as a family to prepare an emergency kit if you don't already have one or use the time to check your emergency supplies to make sure you have key items on hand and that the items inside are not expired.



BE AWARE OF SCHOOL EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Make sure you read information from the school about their plan for emergencies, emergency procedures and alternate locations should an emergency take place. Check that the school has current emergency contact information for your children. This includes work, mobile and home telephone numbers.



DO YOU HAVE AN EMERGENCY PLAN

It will take you about 20 minutes to make a family emergency plan. Work as a family to discuss the following, then record them as part of your plan:

- Safe exits from home and neighbourhood
- Meeting places to reunite with family or roommates
- Designated person to pick up children should you be unavailable
- Contact persons close-by and out-of-town
- Health and insurance information
- Places for your pet to stay
- Risks in your region
- Location of your fire extinguisher, water valve, electrical panel, gas valve and floor drain

By-Law Enforcement

Recreation Vehicle (RV) Parking:

Notice to all RV/boat owners. Our Zoning By-law allows front driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1 – October 31. After October 31, front driveway storage of these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. After October 31, the vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5-foot setback from adjacent properties.

Winter Parking

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15th and remain in place until March 31, 2027 in accordance with By-law 48-20. For snow removal purposes, parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at owners' expense. The set fine for this violation is set at \$50. No unauthorized overnight parking is permitted at the Thamesford District Recreation Centre.

Leaves/snow removal on to Roadways

The autumn season is quickly approaching and therefore the leaves will begin to fall. As a reminder to all residents, depositing your leaves onto the roadway and sidewalk is dangerous and is a contravention of the Clearing Refuse from Land By-law No. 16-18. If you wish to drop off your yard waste, visit the County of Oxford website to view all brush, leaf, and yard waste depot locations. Pushing or placing any leaves, snow or ice on to roadway, or any other obstruction of a roadway is an offence that carries a Provincial Offences Fine of \$200.00.

Keeping Properties Clean and Clear

In the Township of Zorra, all grass and weeds must be maintained at a height less than 8 inches. This is done to promote safety in the Township, including pest-control, as well as to maintain the appearance of Zorra. Further, property owners and tenants shall keep their land free from industrial and domestic wastes, inoperable motorized vehicles (both licensed or unlicensed), vehicle parts, construction materials, and other refuse. If refuse has started to accumulate on your property, you are required to place it in appropriate containers, stored at the side or rear of your lot, and placed curbside within 14 days.

2026 TAX NEWS



Property Tax Billing

Your 2026 final tax bill is enclosed. If you are set up on a pre-authorized plan over 10 or 12 months, you will receive notice of the payments that will be withdrawn from your bank account on the last business day of each month from July to October or July to December. Of your total tax bill, 44% goes to services provided by the Township, while the other 56% goes to service delivery partners including local conservation authorities, the Ontario Provincial Police, the County of Oxford, and local school boards.

*** PLEASE KEEP YOUR PROPERTY TAX BILL FOR YOUR RECORDS ***

There is a \$10 fee for an Annual Statement of your account or for a replacement property tax bill (paper or electronic)

PAYMENT OPTIONS:

Pre-Authorized Payment (PAP) Plan

We offer various PAP Plans to make it easier to pay your tax bill and to help avoid late fees. There is no cost for this service. If you pay by PAP Plan you will receive a final tax bill for your records. Visit zorra.ca/our-services/forms/ to sign up for PAP or e-billing.

Internet Banking

We are set up with most major banks to accept payments using internet banking. You must use your Property Roll Number indicated on your tax bill to register. To setup your property taxes as a bill payment through your online banking, go to "add a bill" and search for "Zorra". Select Zorra Township Tax and enter the Roll Number from your tax bill as your account number. Use your 15-digit roll number, excluding the dashes. Please allow **3 business days** for the payment to reach the municipality.

Mail

If you are mailing a cheque (payable to Township of Zorra) allow sufficient time for delivery.

Visit / Drop-Box at the Municipal Office

Payment may be made in-person by cash, cheque, or debit at the Municipal Office during business hours (Monday to Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.). If paying in person, be sure to bring your bill with you. Payment may also be made via the drop box at the municipal office, beside the main door. Cheques only!

Penalty and Interest Charges

Payments are not applied to accounts until the funds are received by the Township. Payment through a financial institution can take up to 3 business days to reach us and mail delivery may be delayed. Penalty and interest charges of 1.25% will be added to instalments not paid (and received by the Township) by the due date. Interest charges are applied on the first day of each month until the balance is paid. Failure to receive a tax bill does not exempt the taxpayer from late payment charges.

The Fire Hall building on Oxford Road 96 – and the emergency response crew it's home to whose activities in the community are so appreciated – seem now like so much a part of the fabric of the Uniondale/Medina/Lakeside/Harrington district that it might be hard to believe there was a time none of that existed.

But it was just over 50 years ago, on Jan. 1, 1976, that the Uniondale Fire Department officially came into being under the direction of inaugural Fire Chief Frank Rietmeyer. Until then, fire protection service for the area was provided by volunteer departments in St. Marys, Thamesford and Embro.

Former District Fire Chief and current Zorra Township Councillor Paul Mitchell wrote a history of the department for the 2012 history book "East Nissouri Township: People, Perseverance, Progress." He recalled how a decision was made at the township level to establish a volunteer Uniondale force and construct a new fire hall, with then ward Councillor Dave Slater "assigned the task of recruiting a group of people interested in and capable of becoming firefighters."

Those "Original 16" – as they're referred to in an exhaustive scrapbook kept by the man who became the longest-serving among them, Ron King – spent the fall of 1975 training under the direction of Chief Joe Wallace of the Thamesford Fire Department.

"Their first truck, a 1974 pumper with a 650-gallon tank," Mitchell's account relates, "was purchased from King Seagrave at a cost of \$40,000. Keys to the new truck were presented to Rietmeyer at a ceremony on Oct. 25, 1975."

For six months, until the fire hall was completed in June of 1976, the force operated out of the yard and dispatch office of Hutton Transport across the road. During a recent interview, King recalled a Sunday morning fire call when a parked transport truck inadvertently blocked the Uniondale fire truck from exiting the yard.

"(Hutton Transport President) Wallace Hutton didn't get mad very often but he was pretty upset when he learned the fire truck had been blocked in," King recalled. "It was a good job (Fire Chief) Frank was there because none of the rest of us knew how to drive truck."

The original fire hall had a flat asphalt roof.

Subsequent improvements included a sloped steel roof, a radio repeater tower and a 5,000-gallon underwater water tank. But for the most part, the double-bay building has remained unchanged.

Mitchell's account in the East Nissouri history book states that the department's "first official call was to a chimney fire at the farmhouse of Chester and Joyce West on Highway 19 south of Medina. The second call was to a shop fire at the home of Melville and Win Vannatter in Lakeside."

King remembers that, at the time, the department had two Scott Air-Paks (a self-contained breathing apparatus manufactured by Scott Safety, a company now owned by 3M) and four of the oxygen cylinders needed for their use.

The Uniondale station now has 12 Air-Paks and at least two cylinders for every Air-Pak.

Mitchell wrote in 2012 that "the first personal protective equipment for the firefighters consisted of the traditional long black coats, thigh-high rubber boots and thin plastic helmets. These not only provided a minimum of protection but they were clumsy to work in and

cold in the winter." In 1989, a transition began to outfitting the firefighters with more modern gear including helmets made of Kevlar.

"Everything to do with the fire department has an expiry date," current Uniondale Station District Chief Scott Matheson explained during a recent conversation at the fire hall. "That's something you've always got to keep your eye on so that you know there's a budget for inspections and upgrades and new equipment."

The biggest budget items, of course, are the vehicles.

Mitchell wrote in his history book account that the Uniondale "fleet was soon doubled with the addition of a 1947 tanker which had just been replaced at the Thamesford hall. Despite having to replace the 500-gallon water tank, which sprang a huge leak going over some railway tracks, this antique remained in service until 1985 when it was replaced by a new tanker."

Lakeside News correspondent to the St. Marys Journal Argus Ruth Skillings provided some details about this story when she wrote about the retirement in 1996 of inaugural Fire Chief Frank Rietmeyer. "On the very first call (with the newly-acquired, then 31-year-old tanker truck), to a car fire east of Lakeside, while going over the tracks at Lakeside, a big chunk of rust fell off the bottom of the tank. By the time they got to the car, there wasn't one drop of water left in the tank."

"The original pumper was replaced in 1997 and the second tanker was replaced in 2008 by a 2,000-gallon tandem truck," Mitchell wrote in 2012. "They were both custom-built for Uniondale by the Metalfab Fire Apparatus Co. in New Brunswick."

Protective equipment definitely has improved since 1976, but King and Matheson agree that the biggest transformation since the Uniondale Fire Department formed is definitely the paging system.

Fifty years ago, the 911 emergency dispatch system wasn't yet in place in rural Ontario. As part of its launch, the department secured a dedicated seven-digit fire-call number in the Uniondale telephone exchange. If someone dialed that number, the phone rang simultaneously in the homes of four firefighters – Marjorie and George Whittaker, Gail and Don Adams, Fieke and Frank Rietmeyer, Teresa and Bill Rouvers – plus the dispatch office of Hutton Transport. In an era before voicemail, there had to be someone present in one of those locations at all times to ensure not just a timely response but a response at all.

This bit of trivia speaks to the valuable

support provided in those early days to the fire department by two groups of people: management and employees of Hutton Transport; and the wives and family members of the original Uniondale firefighters.

King remembers one Sunday morning call when the men in whose homes the first-call telephones were located were either attending a worship service or toiling in their dairy barn. Hutton Transport would also typically have been pretty quiet but employee Bill McKay just happened to be in the vicinity of the dispatch office and heard and answered the call.

He also remembers it was always the women in the households receiving the initial fire call who immediately initiated a "telephone pyramid"



to inform the rest of the department about the situation – not just that it was happening, but what type of call it was and where it was unfolding.

Rietmeyer, interviewed for the St. Marys Journal Argus at the time of his retirement, stated, "the whole family was needed to make the system run smoothly and they never let us down."

It goes without saying, of course, that the dedication and support from spouses and family members of firefighters – and all first responders – continues today as a major factor in the ability of Ontario residents to be confident of timely and professional response to emergencies.

In 1983, a pager system was purchased to alert each firefighter when a call came in, through a dispatch service based in Woodstock. They

would then have to call the fire dispatch number to find out the details.

“Response times were further improved in 1997 with the introduction of the 911 system in Oxford County,” Mitchell wrote in his history book account. As part of the transition, “the roads and sideroads were renamed or renumbered to make locating the emergency scene faster and easier.”

Updated versions of the pagers are still in use today. Because the radio frequency technology of the pagers is much more reliable across the Uniondale Station service area than any cellphone network, they still provide the initial signal to firefighters that they’re needed. Once a page is detected, firefighters use their smartphone to check the app and find out call details.

Another big change is the coordination that now takes place between the three fire stations in Zorra Township. For many years, Embro, Thamesford and Uniondale operated as separate fire departments, competing in some ways for the attention and resources of the municipal government upon which they largely rely for funding.

Throughout that time, it was a big thing if one department had to call upon another for support. For structure fires, it became common to send out a call to a neighbouring department for additional water in the form of a tanker truck. But actually putting out the call for additional help in the form of firefighters was rare.

“Even when I started in 2011, it was a lot of ‘us’ and ‘them,’” current Uniondale District Chief Matheson said. Because there wasn’t regular interaction between members of the three departments and they had separate chiefs, there was a reluctance to call for additional help. The mindset persisted that the core Uniondale firefighters – or, correspondingly, the Embro and Thamesford crews in their service areas – should be able to handle it themselves.

“In October 2009, the largest change to the fire service in Zorra Township in over 30 years took place when Council hired Jeff Smith from the Norfolk Fire Service as the first ever Fire Chief for the Zorra Fire and Emergency Services,” Mitchell wrote in his history book account. “With this re-organization, the individual fire departments in Thamesford, Embro and Uniondale became known as Station #1 Thamesford, Station #2 Embro, and Station #3 Uniondale.”

Matheson says that since the amalgamation, thanks in large part to three successive Zorra Fire Chiefs who bought into and wholeheartedly

supported the new model, the “us versus them” feeling is a thing of the past. A call to Embro or Thamesford for additional water is now “instantaneous” if it’s a structural fire call, he said. As for additional firefighters, “nobody’s afraid to call anybody else for help.”

When a 911 call is directed Uniondale’s way and the firefighters’ pagers go off, their responses to the dispatch app on their smartphones informs Matheson how many crew members are available at that time. For those arriving at the fire station first who take on the task of loading the trucks with gear, a screen on the wall beside the big rolling doors shows where exactly each firefighter is in relation to the emergency site.

“If I see that we might be short-staffed, I’ll call (the other Zorra stations) right away. If they come and it turns out they’re not needed, that’s fine. We can send them home.”

Although this isn’t universal across Ontario or even across Zorra Township, Uniondale’s protocol has always been to load the trucks with gear then



proceed to the emergency site with firefighters who arrived early to the station on the trucks. Any crew member too far away to respond that quickly proceeds to the call location on their own.

Before the smartphone app, King recalls, the protocol was to proceed to the end of the firehall driveway, wait a few seconds to see if any other crew members were on their way to the station, then hurry to the emergency site.

A version of that protocol remains in place today. Matheson notes that he’s currently the

Uniondale firefighter residing furthest from the station and, often, he’ll know from his smartphone app that several firefighters are already en route to the station and he can instead proceed directly to the call location to assess the situation and establish a response plan.

Training has also changed dramatically. Matheson was one of the first Uniondale firefighters hired under a training regimen introduced in 2010 requiring eight months of sessions held during weekends prior to the new recruits officially joining the force.

“Before that it was basically ‘here’s your helmet. We’ll train you as we go.’”

In the years since, training requirements have become even more rigorous. Liability – for the firefighters themselves and for the township for which they serve – is a major driver but so is the increasing complexity of the scenarios to which volunteer fire departments might find themselves summoned.

“In the late 1970s and early 1980s the Uniondale Fire Department might respond to 10-15 emergency calls per year, almost all of which were some type of fire,” Mitchell wrote in his East Nissouri history book account. “Throughout the late 1980s and into the 1990s the role of the fire department evolved to include attending more motor vehicle collisions (MVCs) as well as medical emergencies.”

“Currently the local station responds to 25-30 calls per year including assisting Embro and Thamesford at larger fires,” Matheson confirmed that number is still roughly accurate today, referring to the Uniondale crew as “an average 30-to-40 call hall” – significantly fewer than some volunteer fire departments in Ontario that are located close to 400-series highways with a high number of MVC calls.

Matheson explains that, nowadays, the training required of anyone joining a volunteer fire department in Ontario makes them fully qualified to apply for professional firefighter positions on any city force. That’s great for building a crew that can focus entirely on putting that training into action without hesitation, but he also knows that “some departments struggle” finding replacements when firefighters retire.

So far, Uniondale has not faced that challenge. “For any of our new recruits, (the training regimen) is a huge ask in terms of commitment . . . And it always amazes me that, every time we need new recruits, we always find them.”

Reflecting on this, and looking back at photos of “The original 16” in Ron King’s scrapbook, Matheson



notes that the face of volunteer fire protection in the Uniondale area has changed in 50 years.

Back then, a few of the men who answered Councillor Dave Slater’s call hadn’t yet begun having kids but most had young families at home. New recruits now, the current Uniondale District Chief says, tend to be younger with no kids and the availability to commit every weekend for several months for training.

Plus, almost all of those “Original 16” worked – either on their farm or for an employer nearby – within the Uniondale force’s service area. “That’s part of the thinking in wanting to have a few more people recruited (Uniondale now has 18 firefighters and would like to recruit one more) or in putting out the call to another station for help.”

“Because when you get to a fire scene, when things start rolling, you can sometimes need a lot of people.”

One thing that certainly hasn’t changed is the camaraderie that forms the basis of every well-executed emergency response. From the beginning on Jan. 1, 1976, the firefighters from the Uniondale hall have been able to trust they have back-up from everyone else on the force.

“The guys are like a big family,” King stated, while Matheson added that “you never worry about whether you’re making the right decision in the moment because you always know there are a bunch of other firefighters right there with you, looking at the same situation and supporting you.”

Elected Offices

Municipal elections are held every four years, with the next municipal election being held on **Monday, October 26, 2026**. Eligible electors will cast their votes for Township of Zorra Council and School Board Trustee offices.

Zorra Council Offices: Mayor, Four (4) Ward Councillors (Ward 1 Councillor, Ward 2 Councillor, Ward 3 Councillor, and Ward 4 Councillor).

School Board Trustee Offices: Thames Valley District School Board Trustee (2); London District Catholic School Board Trustee (1); Conseil Scolaire Catholique Providence (1) for the Counties of Oxford, Perth & Grey; Conseil Scolaire Viamonde (1) for the Counties of Oxford, Elgin, Lambton, Municipalities of Haldimand-Norfolk & Chatham-Kent.

Are you on the Voters' List?

If you haven't already, please ensure that you are on the Voters' List and your information is correct. From now until July 31, 2026, you may check if you are on the Voters' List by visiting RegisterToVoteON.ca

From August 1 to Election Day, please visit the Township website and submit a "Am I on the Voters' List?" request.

Voting Methods

The Township of Zorra will be using internet and telephone voting for the 2026 election. Zorra used the same voting method for the 2022 election. Eligible voters will be able to cast their vote by internet OR telephone. A Voting PIN Letter will be mailed to those that are on the Voters' List in early October. The Voting PIN Letter will contain an individualized PIN for the voter to use to cast their vote. The voter simply follows the instructions in their kit and chooses between telephone voting or internet voting.

To vote by telephone, the voter will call the number provided in the voting kit, enter the individualized PIN number and the voter's birth day, and then the voter will cast their vote (and use the '#' button to confirm the selections).

To vote by internet, the voter will visit the voting website provided in the Voting PIN letter. The voter will enter their individualized PIN number and the voters' birth date. The voter will follow the prompts through all contests and complete their ballot by pressing 'Cast Ballot'.

Beginning on **Tuesday, October 13** until the end of Voting Day on **Monday, October 26**, eligible voters may attend the Zorra Municipal Centre during office hours to use the computer/tablet, internet access, or touch-tone telephone for voting purposes.

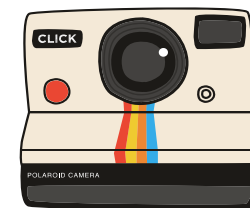

ZORRA Wardens

What's so "great" about being Oxford County warden? It's not a prison warden (we are not prisoners). The warden is head of county council; overseeing council meetings, speaking on behalf of the County at official events; interacting with other levels of government and, to the extent each warden feels comfortable doing so, participating in higher level administrative discussions.

The pertinent point for Zorra Heritage Committee's (ZHC) is that when a member of county council representing Zorra is elected by the other members of County Council to be warden, they are meeting the criteria to be considered a "Great of Zorra" because they are being recognized for their contribution outside of Zorra.

Our current warden is the Mayor of Zorra, but how many wardens before him represented Zorra and deserve to be included as a "Great"? The previous Zorra warden, Claire G. Minler, served in 1972 when the term was only 1 year. Since the County of Oxford was created in 1850, we've had 36 Zorra wardens. They came from all corners of Zorra, including each of the pre-amalgamation municipalities: East Nissouri, Embro, North Oxford and West Zorra.

Trojans Hockey

The Trojans are celebrating 50 years of Hometown Hockey in Thamesford!



The Thamesford Trojans were founded in 1976 as members of the Western Ontario Junior D Hockey League, then moved to the OHA Junior Development League in 1991. In 2006, the OHAJDL was disbanded and replaced with the Southern Ontario Junior Hockey League where the Trojans played until moving to Provincial Junior Hockey League Junior C in 2016.

The Trojans won 9 Ontario Junior D championships – the only team in Jr D history with that many titles. The most notable of these championships were the 1989-1992 seasons and the 2010-2012 seasons, where the Trojans won the Ontario title for three consecutive seasons, being the only team in league history to accomplish this feat not only once, but twice. As part of the PJHL Jr C Yeck Division, the Trojans have won two division titles in back-to-back seasons 2022-2023 and 2023-2024.

The Trojans continue to be one of the few remaining community-owned teams in the PJHL. The team is run by a volunteer board made up of several community members. This means that the team relies entirely on community support to keep the team on the ice. We accomplish this through fundraising and sponsorships.

The 50th season of Trojans hockey will kick off with a Home Opener in Thamesford on Saturday, September 19th at 2:30pm against the Lucan Irish. The game will start with a ceremonial puck drop featuring members of the inaugural 76-77 team. Immediately following the game, there will be a social event in the hall with food and drinks available for purchase by the Thamesford Lions Club. There will be a display of trophies, jerseys, and photos from 50 years of Trojans hockey. There will be live music by The Fat Willies, featuring Trojans Alumni players Billy Huitema and Josh Lewis. We are looking forward to catching up with old friends and celebrating this huge milestone for the Trojans. Hope to see you there!
